


CELEBRATION OF BLACK CANADIAN CHOREOGRAPHERS

MESSAGE FROM THE ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Thank you for joining us for this program celebrating three distinct Canadian dance makers.

Ballet Jörgen was founded over 35 years ago to support the creation and dissemination of new Canadian choreography. Many well established Canadian artistic voices such as Crystal Pite and Jean Grand-Maître worked with the company as they staked out their early choreographic paths. To date, the



Company has commissioned 229 new works by 94 choreographers. We have stayed true to our mandate and are living our dream of an all-original repertoire of works, only dancing works created on Ballet Jörgen.

Today's program is a continuation of this dream, bringing together three artists – Katlyn Addison, Jose Carret and Mafa Makhubalo. These artists come from different dance backgrounds which have shaped the works you will see. What they have in common is a deep passion for dance, strong artistic voices, and a dedication to their craft which is all bound by generosity of spirit and relentless energy. They have inspired our dancers and embraced the Company, working around a challenging performance schedule, Covid and their own very busy careers to give us today's program for which I am very grateful.

There are several additional important artistic voices on today's program. I am delighted that we are premiering a new musical composition, a hauntingly beautiful score by Jonathan Sanford. And I am indebted to our three costume designers David Heuvel, Aaliyah Sundar and Stacey-Ann Vassell for their inspired and quick footed work. Likewise, I am indebted to Resident Lighting Designer Madhu Seran for their tireless work on the designs for today's creations. And of course, our dancers are the glue that link this program from beginning to end. Without their vitality, love for dance and simply extraordinary commitment to our art form none of this would be possible – thank you!

We have named the program a Celebration of Black Canadian Choreographers, but we could just as easily have named it a Celebration of Canadian Choreographers or a Celebration of Dance. These works were all commissioned at different times and, without the interruption of Covid, would all have had separate premieres. However, as they are now receiving their premieres together, we chose the name to both celebrate these artists and recognize that artists of colour have been underrepresented in our art form. Together with our partner George Brown College we wanted to take this opportunity to highlight and celebrate the tremendous work carried out by black artists in our own community.

I want to express my enduring gratitude to George Brown College for their support for the Performing Arts. The works on today's program have been created in the dance studios at George Brown College, and the College made it possible for us to premiere them here at the beautiful Young Centre for the Performing Arts as a joint venture between GBC and Soulpepper. I am also grateful to Soulpepper and the Young Centre for assisting us with this program.

I want to recognize the importance of operating support from our public funding partners the Ontario Arts Council, The Canada Council for the Arts and the Toronto Arts Council in the commissioning and presentation of new works. And finally, this program is made possible in part by donations from individuals in our community. Thank you all for helping bring these works to life.

CHOREOGRAPHERS



KATLYN ADDISON

Katlyn Addison was born in Ontario, Canada. She began her professional ballet training at ten with the National Ballet School of Canada. She continued training with Quinte Ballet School of Canada, Pacific Northwest Ballet, Boston Ballet, and the Houston Ballet Ben Stevenson Academy.

Katlyn joined Houston Ballet's corps de ballet in 2007. In 2008, she was awarded the Sarah Chapin Langham Award at Youth America Grand Prix and was invited to perform at the prestigious YAGP Gala the same year. In 2011 Katlyn joined Ballet West where she was promoted to Demi-Soloist in 2014, Soloist in 2016, and First Soloist in 2018. In 2021 Katlyn made history when she became the first black, female Principal Artist in Ballet West's 58-year history. Also in 2021, Katlyn was awarded the Performing Arts Fellowship Award by the Utah Division of Fine Arts & Museums.

Katlyn has danced classical, neoclassical, and contemporary works throughout her career including adaptations from John Cranko's Romeo & Juliet as Juliet and Onegin as Tatiana; Adam Sklute's Swan Lake, Sleeping Beauty as Aurora, and Mrytha in Giselle; George Balanchine's Prodigal Son, Jewels, The Four Temperaments, and Concerto Barocco; Williams Forsythe's In the Middle, Somewhat Elevated; Jiri Kylian's Petite Mort, Return to a Strange Land, and Falling Angels; Ben Stevenson's Dracula, Cinderella, Sleeping Beauty, and La Bayadere; and many other ballets. She has also performed in several world premieres

including Christopher Bruce's *Grinning in Your Face*; Stanton Welch's *Medieval Babes*; Val Caniparoli's *The Lottery and Dances for Lou*; Nicolo Fonte's *Rite of Spring and Carmina Burana*; and Africa Guzman's *Sweet and Bitter*.

In 2016 Katlyn was the first black principal ballerina to perform the role of the "Sugar Plum Fairy" in Willam Christensen's *The Nutcracker*.

Katlyn performed for attendees of the 68th United Nations Civil Society Conference, dancing the role of Mother Earth in The Way of the Rain - Earth Movements - A Symphony for Ballet with choreography by Emily Adams.

Throughout the fall and winter of 2019-2020, Katlyn performed the principal/soloist roles at the Scottish Ballet in Glasgow Scotland including Tituba in Helen Pickettes' The Crucible and Snow Queen choreographed by Christopher Hampson, Artistic Director of Scottish Ballet. She returned to Scotland in the Fall of 2022 for a repeat tour of Snow Queen.

In June of 2022, Katlyn was featured in Reforming the Narrative at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C. where she performed a lead role in a new ballet created by renowned choreographer Donald Byrd.

Katlyn has also worked to find her choreographic voice. In 2015, Katlyn was chosen to choreograph a work, which she titled *The Hunt* for Ballet West's Choreographic Festival Program. She was again selected to create new works for the festival in 2018 (*Hidden Voices*) and 2021 (*Eden*). She also created new ballets for the Utah Arts Festival (*Unnamed*), the Ballet West Academy, and the University of Utah Dance Department (*Saint-George, The Composer, Frenchmen, and Creator*).

In early, 2022 Kansas City Ballet premiered Katlyn's new work *Sanctuary*, and she recently completed a new work for Bayou Ballet and another work for Ballet Jörgen, both premiering in May 2023.

Katlyn has appeared in numerous publications, programs, and films. In 2015 Huffington Post named her as one of the top "26 black female dancers you should know", and she has regularly been featured in Pointe and Dance Magazine. Katlyn danced and acted in Miu Miu Woman's Tales, a short film that premiered at the 2017 Venice Film Festival and appeared on the Prada Miu Miu website. She was also featured in an episode of "Let's Talk Utah" produced by the Utah Office of Tourism in the fall of 2021.

In early 2022, Katlyn was included as an honoree in Microsoft's virtual interactive museum, *The Legacy Project*. She was also featured in the Utah Black Chamber's book *Black Utah: Stories of a Thriving Community*.

Katlyn is involved in many passion projects and is dedicated to using her platform to give back to her community and to help raise the voices of other minority artists. Katlyn has volunteered her time for: the Redlining Project, an initiative drawing attention to injustices created by redlining voter districts; Ballet West's I CAN DO Program; Curly ME, which supports young girls of color; and Morning Star Middle School and Ridgewood Elementary School, both in Ontario, Canada; and she also serves on the board of directors for the Utah Black Artist Collective.



JOSE ANGEL CARRET

Cuban born Mr. Carret is an award winning choreographer and principal dancer who has created more than 60 original works. He was a principal dancer and choreographer at Danza Espiral from Matanzas, Cuba, and performed many renowned Cuban choreographers' works such as Narciso Medina's piece "Meta-morphosis," a modern Cuban classic.

He has created choreographies for the International Ballet competitions in Cuba, and the Youth America Grand Prix international competition (2018) held in Canada.

Many of his awarded works are still part of the repertoire of several companies such as Danza Libre, Danza Fragmentada from Guantanamo, Cuba, and Ballet Creole Canada, among others. As a principal dancer, he toured in Spain, Canada, Martinica, Saint Kitts & Nevis, and Guadalupe. Mr. Carret performed at the International Ballet Festival in Cuba. One his awarded piece – Invernal, was danced at a special gala in which a Dance Award was given to Prima Ballerina Absoluta Alicia Alonso.

Mr. Carret received many awards given by prestigious dance artists in Cuba, such as Narciso Medina, Clara Luz Rodriguez, Isidro Leonardo Rolando Thondike, Ramiro Guerra, and etc.

Mr. Carret firstly shared his unique Cuban dance style and heritage with Canadian audiences in 2005 as a guest dancer with decidedly Jazz Danceworks (Calgary) and Dance Immersion's Erie Music Choreographers Festival (2010).

His many credits include permanent guest teaching and choreographing for Toronto's Ballet Creole School and Company and guest choreographer for Ballet Jörgen Canada (2011-12 Solos and Duets series). Since 2015 he is a guest teacher at the acclaimed University of North Carolina's School of the Arts Dance Program (Winston Salem, USA).

Jose is the Founding Artistic Director of Danza Corpus (Cuba) and Danza Corpus Canada (DCC). Danza Corpus Canada was awarded the Aboriginal and Culturally Diverse Training Grant by the Ontario Arts Council in 2014, 2015, and 2016. In 2016, Mr. Carret served as the Ontario Arts Council's Artistic Advisor for Operational Grants. Mr. Carret is the founder and the artistic director of International Dance Intensive TEADE (since 2011) in Cuba every summer and recently has done the first International Virtual IX Version last July 2020. He is a member of Dance Ontario.



MAFA MAKHUBALO

Mafa Makhubalo is a movement poet trained in folk forms from the Regions of African tradition, African contemporary, and Western-Contemporary. "My understanding of dance has influenced me as an accumulation of memory and the history of my culture." He has been actively involved in community engagement camps and arts education programs.

Between 2019-2020, Mafa completed a mentorship placement with Younge People's Theatre as part of the Arts Management program at Centennial College. During the 2020-2021 period, Mafa has been a mentor for the Vibes Arts Cohort 2, a resident choreographer with Ballet Jörgen Canada and Theatre Passe Muraille 11:11 production. Mafa participated in the Ontario-Quebec cohort program 2019-2021 presented by (LaDSR) La danse sur les routes du Ouébec and Ontario Presents. He has served on the juries for the Ontario Arts Council, Toronto Arts Council, Toronto Arts Foundation, and TAC Open Door Grant.



JONATHAN SANFORD

Jonathan Sanford is a Los Angeles-based composer, music producer, and saxophonist scoring music for films, television, and stage. He is known for bringing unique sounds and unexpected ideas through an analog exploration process.

Sanford recently scored the drama feature National Champions for STX Entertainment directed by Ric Waugh and starring J.K. Simmons, Stephan James, and Uzo Aduba. His other recent work includes the Universal / Netflix comedy feature Good On Paper starring Iliza Schlesinger and Margaret Cho and directed by Kimmy Gatewood, Teenage Bounty Hunters, a Netflix series from Tilted Productions (GLOW, Orange Is The New Black, Weeds), the Netflix series Social Distance, the documentary Hold Your Fire which premiered at the Toronto Film Festival, the drama romance feature On Our Way, and the comedy drama feature Welcome Matt. He is also the composer of USA's noir television drama Dare Me, based on the novel by Megan Abbott. Upcoming for Ionathan is the NBCUniversal / Amazon TV series As We See It from executive producer lason Katims.

Sanford's other previous work includes That Moment When for PBSNews
Hour/Facebook Watch, original songs for YouTube's Weird City, score for the EKO interactive series Timeline, and Off-Broadway stage play Tomorrow In The Battle (Stripped Scripts).

Sanford has also scored documentaries for Syracuse professor Richard Breyer, tracks for Run and Jump directed by Oscarnominated Steph Green, and short films with premieres at Tribeca and Cannes Film Festivals.

Sanford was born in Baltimore, Maryland, studying piano and violin before deciding on the saxophone at age nine. Jonathan went on to study classical saxophone, under the tutelage of Dr. Frederick Hemke at Northwestern University, where he was also a member of the 1996 Big Ten Championship Football Team. As a saxophonist and vocalist, Jonathan has shared the stage with legendary artists including Max Roach, Eddie Palmieri, Danilo Perez, and Bobby McFerrin.



DAVID HEUVEL

David Heuvel continues to have an illustrious career in costume design and production that has taken him to every corner of the globe. Five decades ago, Heuvel started as an apprentice at the Opera Theatre in Pretoria, South Africa. He quickly moved up the ranks in the state-run arts organization to become the director of the costume shop for PACT Ballet. In 1979, then-artistic director of Ballet West. Bruce Marks, invited Heuvel to head the fledgling company's costume shop. Under Marks, Heuvel helped build the reputation of Ballet West from a regional ballet company to one with international stature. The company received worldwide acclaim, with international tours, daring new works, and notable artistry on stage, from the dancers, and, yes, the costumes.

The Ballet West costume shop, under Heuvel's direction, is unparalleled. Today, few companies have the luxury of the vast talent and experience that he offers.

From cohesive designs with historical accuracy, to the ability to dye garments, his costume shop is the definition of full-service. "My philosophy is that the costume must move with the dancer," says Heuvel. "If they touch the stage feeling comfortable and regal, I have done my job."

Apart from Heuvel's work with Ballet West, he has designed and built costumes for ballet companies both nationally and international, including Ballet Du Nord (France), Alberta Ballet, Ballet Met, Singapore Ballet, Oregon Ballet Theatre, Atlanta Ballet, American Repertory Ballet, Carolina Ballet, Ballet Hawaii, Nashville Ballet, and Ballet Memphis. In December 2018, he received Governor Gary Herbert's prestigious Artist Award for Visual Arts.

STACEY-ANN VASSELL

Stacey-Ann Vassell is a Jamaican born costume and fashion designer. She is the face behind the fashion brand NUYUBYSTACY that designs casual to formal clothes for women and children of all ages, shapes and sizes. For more than 20 years this versatile costume designer's work can be seen in theatre, dance, television, pageants; fashion shows and music videos. This award-winning designer likes to bring stories and characters to life through a detailed analysis of historical facts coupled with her own sense of design. Stacey-Ann looks forward to this collaboration with Mafa Makhubalo and Ballet Jörgen.

MADHU/ மது

Madhu is an Ilankai-Tamil Canadian, originally growing up in Scarborough, and later Richmond Hill, having originally joined Canada's Ballet Jörgen in 2019 as their Lighting Director shortly after graduating from York University with a BFA with Honours in Theatre Production and Design. In addition to the role of Lighting Director, Madhu took on the role of Assistant Technical Director during the 2021-2022 season, and then Associate Technical Director during the first half of the 2022-2023 season, before joining full time as Resident Lighting Designer and Assistant Production Manager.

In addition to lighting and media design, Madhu also holds experience in 3d modeling & art, wardrobe, and IT Technology.
